Revelation: to unveil, something that is made known to us that we would otherwise never know. It assumes that this is information outside of self-knowledge. It assumes that it is knowledge that cannot be gained through human effort.

(vs. 1) "spoke" - indicates a progressive past, a process that has continued over a period of time

(vs. 2) "has spoken" - indicates the process is finished, completed, not to continue

Notes:

- 1. God's self-disclosure personal, interested in His creation, initiating relationship
 - Began in ages past in bits and pieces through prophets
 - In these days, it culminated in Jesus as God's unique self revelation
- 2. **Messianic Expectations** Hebrew people had been living through 7 centuries as exiled or oppressed people longing for a rescuing Messiah. God sends words of hope through prophets to expect *Him*.
 - Hebrew faith is *anticipatory* of someone yet to come.--expecting a human king who worked in concert with Majestic God
 - Made a distinction between God fulfilling their messianic hopes and the Messianic figure Himself.

Key Thoughts:

- 1. OT quotes used to argue that the messianic human and majestic God meet in Jesus.
- 2. Author is saying in effect, "Hebrews you think you will be returning to God—in fact you will be turning from Him."
